



DATA PROFILE: 2023

OUR NEIGHBORHOOD

- 45% of Oakland's Black residents live in poverty
- 3 times as many preschool-aged children as there are licensed preschool slots
- As of 2021 0% of caregivers of African American/Black Medi-Cal eligible newborns in the 40X40 received ample economic support







Roots Community Health Center, initiated in 2008 by two volunteers in a single exam room, has evolved into a substantial organization of more than 200 employees across ten sites, driven by the vision of addressing health disparities among Oakland's low-income Black and Brown communities. The Stay Ready for School initiative is targeted towards our Black families here in East Oakland. Understanding the critical impact of neighborhood environments on child development, Roots actively engages in neighborhood development initiatives in East Oakland's 40x40 area, a roughly 40 by 40 block area (from Seminary Ave to the Oakland-San Leandro border, from MacArthur Blvd. to the Bay) that is home to approximately 30,000 people of African descent, the largest concentration of Black residents in Oakland's flatlands.

Over 40% of Black children in the County live in poverty, a rate over ten times higher the rate of poverty for white children.
